

Webcast: Understanding the Trump Administration's Impact on Government Contractors and Grant Recipients

The federal funding landscape has shifted dramatically in 2025 under the Trump administration. Executive orders targeting diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) initiatives, heightened scrutiny under the False Claims Act, and proposed regulatory changes are reshaping compliance obligations across sectors. These sweeping changes to federal funding policy have triggered a wave of contract and grant terminations that have landed squarely in the courts. Recent decisions – including Supreme Court rulings and conflicting circuit opinions – have complicated the path to relief, particularly for plaintiffs seeking equitable remedies like reinstatement of grants or contracts. From grant challenges to oversight of contractor conduct, understanding the evolving regulatory terrain is essential.

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
